ABOUT OUR PROGRAM

First Responders and Criminal Justice Professionals through hands-on training will explore the true meaning of *compassionate and empathetic* service to others. In a common scenario, an officer is dispatched to a report of a homeless person who is sleeping outside of a business and who the business owner wants removed. Reflect for a moment on what training, empathy and problem solving ability you would want that officer to have? What messages and directives does he or she get from the agency and leadership for whom they are employed? What opportunities are there for creative partnerships and different problems solving approaches? How can a community's public safety and civic leaders ensure that the policies and practices it adopts to address these issues are effective and humane? Equally important is the need to know and understand our communities. De-escalation techniques rely on our understanding our diverse community.
